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Where Wildflowers Bloom

Ma Do Lar Shae, a young Lahu woman from Pintauk village—located about 13 miles from Keng Tung—is a person driven by a strong work ethic. Although financial difficulties within her family limited her education to the tenth grade, her life took a transformative turn when she attended a vocational flower-arrangement course. This training was provided by the Braveheart Foundation in Keng Tung.

Today, Ma Do Lar Shae has successfully opened her own floral shop in her village and has already crafted over 20 beautiful, unique floral arrangements. She is deeply grateful to the Braveheart Foundation for providing the free training, as it has enabled her not only to earn her own income but also to create job opportunities for other local youths.

Dignity and Rights

People with disabilities are not a class of people seeking special privileges; they simply require the same fundamental rights available to everyone else.

In collaboration with the Department of Social Welfare, Braveheart has assisted children from the Aye Metta School for the Disabled in obtaining essential documentation. To date, they have successfully helped 20 children receive Citizenship Scrutiny Cards (CSC) and 17 children receive Smart Cards (UID). This initiative marks a crucial step toward ensuring these children can access future healthcare services and pursue higher education.

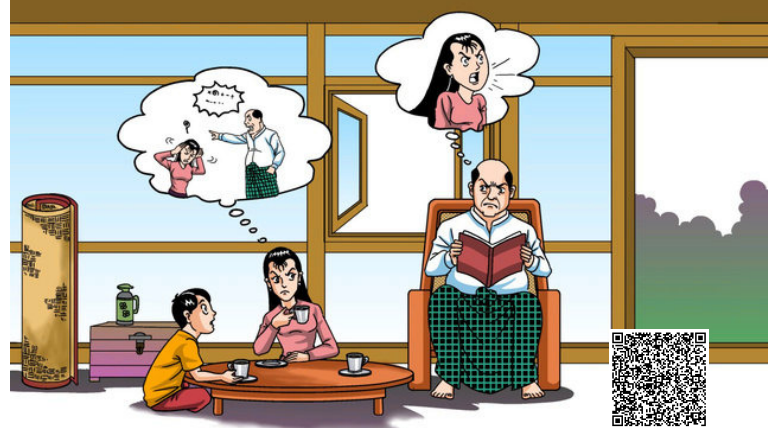


Breaking the Silence

PROMOTING SOCIAL JUSTICE AND LEGAL EMPOWERMENT THROUGH M-LEN

The Myanmar Legal Empowerment Network (M-LEN), supported by Braveheart Foundation, stands as a strong network aimed at promoting Access to Justice throughout Myanmar. Today, it has grown widely to include over 340 network members, including legal aid providers (Paralegals), civil society organizations (CSOs), and community leaders from various regions.



LEGAL SERVICES ON THE GROUND

Paralegals from M-LEN are providing (free) assistance in legal awareness, community-based dispute resolution (CBDR), and PSEA protection activities for vulnerable populations.

KNOWLEDGE DISSEMINATION THROUGH DIGITAL NETWORKS

Through the M-LEN Facebook page, knowledge on legal affairs, PSEA, and Complaint and Feedback Mechanisms (CFM) is being distributed to over 2,600 followers, showing a significant increase in public trust. Let's build secure and just communities together.



DIRECT HUMANITARIAN SUPPORT FOR IDPs IN HPA-AN

We personally visited and delivered essential hygiene kits to Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) in Hpa-An Township. Beyond providing physical supplies, we conducted extensive awareness sessions on Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA) to ensure a safer environment for women and children. Through these efforts, we aim not only to provide aid but to uphold the dignity of those in need.
